

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This is my fourth and final report as President of the club as I am not standing for the role in the forthcoming year. Having been involved with the club for over 60 years it is time to stand aside.

As I reflect on the years there have been many interesting highlights. After operating for nearly 50 years, the club first admitted females as members in the early 1960s. As can be seen from the photos on the walls they were very successful in District and National competitions, as well as providing great lifeguarding services. The club built a new clubhouse in 1965 and relocated from what is now the Memorial Hall. We are now well through the planning for a replacement for that clubhouse, hopefully completed within the next couple of years. During the time when venues for National Championships moved around the country, our club successfully hosted them twice. I attended many memorable National championships as a competitor, coach and official but one sticks in the mind, being held in Warrington out of Dunedin, where it snowed on the beach!

Throughout all this, the club has grown. It has a very strong nippers' section which continues to feed young members through to become quality lifeguards and competitors. From its early days the bulk of membership came from the Paekākāriki community, then extended to recruiting from Raumati and Tawa swimming clubs, to now having members from all over the Wellington region. I believe that we are a family-oriented club with strong parent support that is attracting membership, which has put us into a strong position.

Although Covid19 has been a major influence on operations we were fortunate that the National Championships were completed just before lockdown. However, a number of other events, such as awards ceremonies, were cancelled or postponed.

In regard to Central Region awards, congratulations to Richard Whinham for obtaining a Distinguished Service award and Elyse Robêrt for obtaining a Service award.

LIFEGUARDING

We kicked off the 2019/2020 season in October with rookie training. This season we qualified 12 new lifeguards. Rookie training was held over an 8-week period with an overnight camp at the end.

This camp is designed to immerse them in lifeguard-life and ensure they are ready to sit their exam, with candidates having to put their skills to the test in a number of scenarios and mock exams. Brianna Norris took the lead on lifeguard training this year and did an outstanding job of ensuring trainings ran smoothly. She was joined by instructors Thomas Downs, Riley Crosbie, Jago Dellow, Ben Strombom, Sarah Warren, Sarah Downs, Grace McCarthy, Katie Trott and Charlotte Meyer.

A special shout out to Thomas, Riley and Ben who on top of lifeguard training also ran our Sunday IRB trainings, this meant spending the majority of their weekends at the beach over the winter as well as patrolling over the summer. We are really lucky to have such a dedicated group of instructors within the club and this shows in the skill level and knowledge of the candidates that Paekākāriki qualifies.

This year we had just under 100 refreshed and actively patrolling lifeguards who completed a total of 2,436 hours of patrolling. It was a busy season for our lifeguards this year, doubling our rescues and assists from the previous season. We performed 6 rescues, assisted 122 people to safety, performed 8 first aids and took part in 1 search.

On top of our regular volunteer patrols and regional guard duties we again took part in lifeguarding events such as the Wellington Ocean swim and Kāpiti Women's Triathlon. Sarah Warren took on the responsibility of 'head of water safety' for both the KWT training swims and the main event stepping up to the challenge of this new role extremely well. The organisers of the KWT were pleased with the professionalism and skill level shown by all guards involved.

Many members continued to work on their development throughout the season with a large number of guards gaining first aid, VHF, and IRB crews. Unfortunately, the 19/20 season was cut short due to Covid-19 and the country going into lockdown; with a number of courses, competitions and patrols having to be cancelled. As the situation surround Covid-19 begins to look more promising, planning has begun for the season ahead with the lifeguard subcommittee meeting earlier this month (in person even!) Winter IRB and rookie training planning is happening with the aim of having them up and running in the next couple of months. SLSNZ development courses will also be starting in July with many of our members keen to brush up on their first aid and lifeguard skills.

Exciting things are happening as we look to make some changes to ensure we are providing the best lifeguard services we can, so watch this space.

DIRECTOR OF SPORT REPORT

As per usual Winter training started off slowly with a lot of our athletes still involved in their winter sport. As things started to warm up and winter sports wound down the numbers at training increased.

Thanks again to "MOANA RD" for enabling the gear trailer to be parked on their premises over the winter training period. Their generosity in putting up with the trailer saves me heaps of time and money. For those that came to Winter training the benefits were clear when we got back to the waves. Putting the hard yards in on the flat harbour water always pays benefits, once you add the pressure of the waves. The benefit of learning to paddle a ski in the flat water was also clear for those first years who made it to winter training and the time in the cold, flat and dark put them well ahead of those who only turned up once we hit the beach. As you can tell from the above comments, I would encourage everyone, but especially the new guys, to attend winter training.

Matt Warren assisted with co-coaching regularly and took the helm when I was unable to make it due to work or family commitments. Thanks again for your support Matt.

Due to lack of interest we did not do any Pool training in the early season this year. It seems we either had swimmers who were committed enough that they trained with a swimming squad or you just plain weren't a swimmer and weren't interested. It was of note that a few of our members committed to some base training with Mana Kayak racing club. This club offers great guidance on Kayak paddling technique and a warm dry Kayak to sit in which is preferable to a ski in the winter months. Anyone with an eye on ski paddling or Ironman should consider the kayaking club.

Thanks to Emma Norris' grant applications the gear was in a really good state and everyone was riding good boards and pretty good skis. Thanks Emma. We will have to wait and see how the funding side of things pans out this year post Coronavirus and the government funding Surf lifesaving.

This year the best weather was probably had over the winter when we didn't see a lot of wind or rain. However, October to February was back to classic Paekak with constant wind and a lot of dirty white-water waves which made structured training difficult. The wild surf also makes keeping everyone safe difficult and during days like that it would be appreciated if parents hung around and helped to keep an eye on the athletes. The weather was so gnarly that our concrete beach access was eroded to the point that it gave way and had to be removed.

We attended the Whangamata Classic and Eastern and Central regionals, with the view that these events are well attended by most of the premier athletes in the country and give our guys the chance to see where they are at in comparison, and to try and foot it with the best. Whilst the teams were small, these comps were enjoyable and team spirit was evident.

Surf sports creates plenty of jobs over and above coaching and managing. These include fixing the gear, trailer towing, trailer packing, accommodation organisation and many more. If you are able to assist with any of these things, please advise me as your help would be appreciated.

This year I thought our young squad competed well and a lot of the guys made massive steps in their surf skills ability. We have a young team who is developing nicely and if we can stick together for a few more years the club will have a great core of highly competitive athletes.

Surf Nationals at Gisborne had a large and challenging surf and I was very proud of the enthusiasm that our guys competed with. Thanks to "Black Dog Consulting" the team looked great in the shirts provided. There was Alex's bronze medal and plenty of near misses which we just need to work on converting into a result.

Thanks to all that have assisted throughout the season. Particular thanks to those that just get on and do stuff year after year that enables our team to attend comps.

SURF BOATS

Early July saw the beginning of another preseason for our boaties. Rather than boat sessions as per previous years, July/August saw us begin with regular erg sessions at the club. This gave us the chance to begin getting the fitness up, while still working on technique and enabling new rowers to get their heads around the requirements of rowing. Also, around this time, the club gave the go ahead to order a new surfboat from Australia. The decision was made to purchase a South Coast Surfboat. With the help of grants from Racing Industry Transition Agency, The Lion Foundation, Infinity Foundation and Aqua Heat (through Greg McCarthy) and with fundraising efforts from all our boaties (movie nights, event guarding, quiz nights, some generous parents and a comedy night). We finally got there (\$40,000 approx. landed in NZ), and are now in a great position boat wise heading into the next couple of seasons. Read on to see if we get it in time for nationals!

Once we hit September, we moved our boats down to Mana and kicked into boat sessions, which marked the start of the season proper. Initially mixed crews of ages and sexes were the norm as we began to assess rowers and began to formulate crews. November saw a couple of local carnivals and an opportunity to start putting that early training into action. It was also a last chance for rowers to impress before crews were finalised for the season.

Off on our 1^{st} away trip to the Whangamata classic, we took 4 crews away. 2 x U19 female and 2 x U23 female. In pretty much flat conditions, the U19 girls finished the day 2^{nd} and 4^{th} . The U23 girls came away with 1^{st} and 3^{rd} for the days racing.

As it does, Christmas saw a short break from in boat training, but crews were back and into it at centrals early in the new year, and we were starting to see a couple of crews beginning to establish themselves as crews to watch at the end of the season. 7 crews traveled to Waimarama. Conditions were a small but tricky wave which was enough to catch out the unwary. The open women (Mum's) raced for the 1st time and managed a 4th in the final. A patched together open men also snuck into

their final and grabbed a creditable 4th. The U19 girls (Poppies), grabbed a 3rd for the day, while 3 crews contested the U23 women's division for Paekak with the "Magpies" continuing their early season form with another win, the "Milkshakes" grabbing 3rd and the "all sorts" (a mix of beginner U19's and 23's) managed a surprise 5th in the final despite their inexperience. The U19 men continued their battle with the Titahi Bay crews and got themselves a 2nd for the day.

North Island champs, the final big hit out pre nationals was a mixed bag. Only 4 crews made finals, with the U19 woman finishing 4th (poppies) and 7th (All sorts). The U19 men (Showtime) won themselves a silver, as did the U23 woman (Magpies), who also walked off with the silver. A little disappointing result wise, but a bit of a wake-up call which led to some good work for 6 weeks leading to nationals.

A training weekend in Foxton 2 weeks prior to nationals was the final heavy load weekend and although painful, was enjoyable as we rebuilt towards Gisborne. Good size surf also allowed rowers and sweeps to sharpen the skills and build confidence.

Late Monday night (2 days prior to travel to Gisborne), saw the arrival of our new boat. Named "The Hooky" after our club stalwart and lover of all thing's surfboat (I may have made that last bit up). We managed a short session Tuesday night for the crews who would row her at nationals and then we were packed and on our way.

Nationals 2020 saw us take 6 crews away. We opted to leave our youngest U19 woman at home, as due to an injury, we struggled to find a replacement for them at short notice. Open woman, Open men, 2 x U23-woman, U19 men, U19 woman took to the sun/rain/wind and great surf of Gisborne for three days and results were a credit to how the crews picked themselves up after the North Islands. The "Mum's" in their 1st season back after starting families, ended up making both their finals which was a pleasing result after juggling the demands of motherhood all season for trainings and on race days (shout out to the Dads who baby sat when required!) The open men were there also (enough said). The U19 men (Showtime) contested a very competitive division to walk away with a bronze in the long course, and silver in the short course. U19 woman (Poppies), grabbed 3rd in their short course final, and 4th in the long. U23 woman (Milkshakes) were 6th in the long course, but the real achievers were the U23 woman (Magpies), who grabbed silver in the short course but were convincing in winning Gold rowing "The Hooky" in the long course final.

The Open men, Showtime and Magpies then combined to pick up a bronze in the surfboat relay final.

So comes the end of another successful season for our boaties. As always, we have many people to thank for their help through the year. Rogan Clark for his continued work providing us with gym/erg and a structured seasons training plan to have us firing at nationals. Peter 'PJ' Jones for his support with transport



and financial backing of his company, Black Dog Consulting. Emma Norris and John Hook for their work with obtaining grants and working the finances to purchase our new boat. Comedy night fundraiser sponsors "Pukeko Rental Managers", and all the parents and supporters who helped us put that night together (\$8000 raised on the night!). Also, for BDC and the Swallow family for their donations on the night. Aqua Heat, Carpentry Plus and SDR Flooring for continued financial support. The Paekakariki Surf Lifeguards management committee, our rowers, and of course our sweeps, Steve Dickson, Richie Whinham, Hayden Keene, Ethan Atkinson, Shane Radovanovich.

IRBs

The season kicked off with a long-distance endurance race at 90 Mile Beach in September. We had one crew competing; Thomas, Ben and Riley came 11th out of a total of 39 crews with a time of 2.38.08. Congratulations to these three on an awesome result in a very tough competition.

This season we had the honour of hosting North Island IRB champs. Paekākāriki put on some spectacular weather and surf and it was great to see so many clubbies getting involved in the weekend which contributed to the event being such a success. There are so many people who deserve to be recognised for the huge amount of organisation that went into the event however a special thanks needs to go to Hooky and Richie for their continued dedication to the club and the sport, without them this event would not have been possible.

On the racing front we had three crews competing from Paekākāriki, one senior men's crew, an open women's and an U19 men's crew. The senior men's crew of Dwight and myself won two golds (Assembly and Mass) and one silver in the single rescue. The woman's crew of Brianna and Amy

made finals in all four of their events while the under 19 men's crew of Otis and Heath made the Assembly final. All crews did exceptionally well especially given this was the first competition for both the open woman and the under 19 men and surf conditions were big. It was great to see our crews competing so well on their home beach.

IRB national champs were due to held in Ruakaka in April however due to Covid-19 and the country going into lockdown this was unfortunately cancelled. Our crews were disappointed to miss out on competing at nationals after training all season however understand and look forward to being back in the boat next season.

We had 6 IRB crewman and 1 IRB driver qualify this season. Congratulations to all those who gained IRB qualifications. This has taken some of the pressure off our existing IRB crew and drivers and we hope to improve on this next season.

Next season is shaping up as a good one with IRB training starting this weekend. Riley and Ben have taken charge of training during the off season and there has been a big interest in IRBs with people wanting to qualify as IRB crew and drivers as well as race in this coming season. We look forward to growing our IRB team and hope to see some new faces in the Paekākāriki tent at North Island Champs next year.
