Covid aside, congratulations to our athletes who performed with distinction over the season in the sport events that went ahead. It is with great sadness that we record the passing of Edward (Ted) Varcoe on 4 June 2021 aged 85.

Ted was a Life Member of Paekakariki Surf Lifeguards, Wellington District and Surf Life Saving NZ.

Ted received his Surf Lifeguard award in 1956 and became an examiner in 1962. He was awarded his Wellington District Service Award in 1975, Wellington Distinguished Service Award in 1981, and Wellington Life Membership in 1998. Ted was a member for over 60 years having a huge involvement in all parts of the Paekakariki SLSC. His SLS journey began at Island Bay, then Titahi Bay before he began his long-time association with Paekakariki.

Ted was a keen competitor, Coach, Instructor, Judge, committee member and with Lesley a driving force behind the clubs 75th and 100th celebrations. He officiated at local, regional, national and international events.

Ted's SLSNZ Honours were SLSNZ Service 1979, SLSNZ Distinguished Service 1990, and SLSNZ Life Membership in 2009. He also held a SLSNZ 50 year badge (2006).

Ted will be remembered as an honest, hardworking member who loved having the sand between his toes and ever loyal to the black and yellow cap.

Our thoughts are with Lesley, Terry, Pete, Dave and their families at this time - Aroha nui.

Surf Boats

After coming out of Covid lockdown, hopes were high for a good season of surf and a chance for everyone to try and resume some sort of normality to their lives.

However, despite the best laid plans, Covid continued to affect the season at different times and eventually brought a premature end to it all.

While still at level 2 in late June, a boatie meeting was held and out of that, and on the back of a successful campaign for our 23's in 19/20. The decision was made for a squad of U 23 girls to begin training with an eye to the NZ trials which were to be held in December.

So began two in boat sessions a week in the dark and cold as well as a start on an erg and gym program outside of the boat.

From June to November the 23's trained relentlessly and as we got closer to the start of the season, were joined by open women and U 19 crews as sessions began to step up. Unfortunately, Covid cancelled the NZ trials and really put a damper on the spirits of the 23's who had done a lot of winter work. The cancelation sucked the air out of the crews for a bit and took a while to lift spirits again, but after a small break, crews restarted and began to focus on the rest of the season ahead.

The club ended up with 6 crews for the majority of the season. There were a few stop/start attempts to get a couple more going but never eventuated due to rowers not being able to make the necessary commitment.

So, with an Open women's, 2 x U 23-women, U 19-women, U 19 men and a masters men's crew based out of Mt Maunganui. The boat section proceeded to attend various competitions around the country. Our new masters crew (acquired from Mt Maunganui and with a few ex Paekak members in it) were a real asset to us this year. With us having generally a younger group of rowers, the older guys provided some much-needed experience under the tent and around the beach, and really got behind our younger crews with support and guidance. Their help was much appreciated this year.



From Whangamata to New Plymouth to Waihi to Piha, plus our local events. The crews provided mixed bags of results.

The U19 men (Show Time) finished 3rd in the national series. They battled all season long with local rivals Titahi Bay at various events, and had their best result at the North Islands where they grabbed silver.

The U23 women (Falcons) were top 3 at every event and would go on to finish 3rd in the national series. Their highlight was winning gold at the Piha Big Wave classic where they won every race in the big surf. The Sea Biscuits (U23 women), had a mixed bag season. Due to injury and availability, there were a few crew changes through the year which hampered their progress. They raced hard all season and would always pick up the odd good result or two at events. In a division that was very strong nationally though it was a step to far with injuries to crack the podium this year.

Our open women (Mum's) trained away quietly through the season and made their 1st appearance at North Islands. Scaring the pants of crews from around the country during the heats, they beat all the form crews on the way to the final. But as so many surf stories go, they would battle Piha for 1st right through the final only to have 3 crews come through on a wave on the line to drop them to 5th. They also went through to the Piha big wave with the Falcons. While results there weren't memorable, they did catch the wave of the day which probably became a season highlight for them.

U 19 Women (Pussy cats). A crew who also went through a few changes through the year, had a season of results that reflected those changes. Solid but unspectacular results early, saw them gradually improve as combinations settled. Silver at CRC's was their best result, but late season form had them building perfectly for nationals.

Masters Men (Master Blasters). As stated above, a new acquisition to the club, but a valuable one. Good, consistent results from these guys all season saw them finish 2nd in the national series in a division that is growing and becoming very competitive. Their top result was Gold at the Whangamata classic, but they were consistently in the top 3 – 4 at every event.

As we all know. A covid our break would force the cancellation of nationals and left a real feeling of unfinished business for everyone.

With some quick phone calls and a little bit of hustling, we managed to organize the inaugural "Surfboat Showdown" between the Titahi bay and Paekakariki boat sections and held a great day's racing at Titahi Bay on what would have been nationals' weekend. Both clubs fronted with crews in every division and the racing was incredibly tough considering all there was to race for was club pride.

The final upshot saw points see sawing through the day before the "pussy cats" pulled out a win in the final race of the day to draw the event at 18 ½ points to each club.

A few beers and meal with the host club afterwards provided some much-needed laughs and banter and put a full stop on what was a crazy and ultimately unsatisfying end to the 20/21 season.

IRB North Island camps was held in Gisborne, Paekakariki had two crew competing. The senior men's crew of Dwight and myself won two golds (mass and assembly rescue) and one silver medal in the single rescue. Our under 19 crew of Rhys Ward and Ben Strombom made their debut, performing exceptionally well, winning a silver in the single rescue and a bronze in the mass rescue.

After a cancelled nationals last season it was great to finally be able to compete at Ruakaka Beach for IRB national champs in April. Rhys Ward and Ben Strombom walked away with a silver medal in the under 19 assembly rescue while Dwight and Tyler had a change of roles this nationals. Dwight competed with Rhys and Ben as tube patient and team manager as Tyler remained home awaiting the arrival of the newest member of the IRB team.

Next season is shaping up as a good one with IRB training starting a couple of weeks ago. Riley and Ben have taken charge of training and it has been great to see large numbers at these trainings. We look forward to growing our IRB team and hope to continue to see new faces in the Paekakariki tent at IRB competitions this season.

New building

In the last year the project has taken some big steps forward. The fundraising has started, more details have been developed with the design and we are moving through the permissions for the build. We have also had good engagement with the community and stakeholders with very positive support overall.

We have developed two working committees that have been developing a fundraising plan and the more technical aspects of the build process.

The Building committee have been working through more detailed design for the building and surrounds. They have also been working on the resource consents and we recently received a lease in principle from Greater Wellington Regional Council which is the product of 9 years of hard work. Within the next 12 months we will be ready to build and pending having the funding support available should be able to start the process. The aim will be to be operating out of the new building in late 2022 or early 2023.

I would like to thank all those that have helped get us to this stage, the project group has grown and it is great to have so many people passionate about making the new building possible. In particular I'd like to acknowledge: Jake Allen, Nicola Trott, Alicia Todd, Hamish Wakefield, Wayne Boness, Nat Perkins, Jenny Rowan and Dale Wills who have all contributed significantly to getting the Lease granted and continue to work on the Resource Consent process.

Funding

Funding this year was going to be a challenge with many venues having to shut for periods of time due to Covid resulting in less funds available. However, we are very grateful for the strong funding we have received and appreciate our funders for their support.

Our goal was to re stock some of our core Lifesaving equipment, update our craft sports equipment and renew some of our IRB gear.

For the year ended 30 April 2021

1. Statement of Accounting Policies:

The financial statements presented here are for the entity Paekakariki Surf Lifeguards Incorporated (PSLG) for the year ended 30 April 2021. PSLG is a New Zealand Incorporated Society formed under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is a registered charity under the Charities Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the (NFP) public benefit entity simple format reporting on the basis it does not have public accountability and its annual expenses are less than \$125,000.

2. Changes in Accounting Policies:

There have been no changes in Accounting Policies. All policies have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

3. Fixed Assets and Depreciation:

All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation of the assets has been calculated at the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007.

The entity has the following asset classes:

Building Contents. 10% Straight Line

Buildings. 2.5% Straight Line

Lifeguard Equipment. 20% Straight Line

Motor Vehicles. 20% Straight Line

Other Assets. 20% Straight Line

Sports Equipment. 20% Straight Line

4. Goods and Services Tax:
